D5 MÉTALLOS 55th CONFERENCE

On November 20-22, 2019, 6 members attended the District 5 Métallos 55th Annual Conference, in Laval, QC: Basil Mhlanga (Unit 604), Brendan Taylor (Unit 602), David Matroud (Unit 602), Local Union Representatives Quebec Hans-Woosly Balan and Pierre-Richard Joseph, and Acting Vice-President Pierre-Luc Dick.

450 activists from across Quebec gathered under the theme 'The Best for Our World', and addressed challenges and opportunities in the fight against climate change, as well as the impact that labour shortages are having on working conditions.

"I was really interested in the panel on Occupational Health and Safety. More than 226 people died in 2018 as a result of a work accident. 83 deaths were linked to homicides, which is unacceptable; the Steelworkers want the government to improve their new reforms, in order to reduce accidents and deaths in the workplace.

Another very interesting topic came from a video, showing retirees traveling from Sept-Iles to Ottawa in 2017, to attend the introduction of a bill that would protect retirees in the event of business bankruptcy. They continued to put pressure in 2018 and 2019, to push the issue forward in Parliament (see Bill C 384)." — Local Union Representative Quebec Pierre-Richard Joseph

32nd FTQ CONFERENCE

On November 25-28, 2019, 943 delegates gathered at the 32nd conference of the Quebec Federation of Labour (FTQ) in Quebec City, under the theme Action In An Ever-Evolving World. Robert Messier (Unit 602), Danis Bouffard (Unit 602), Maxime Deveau (Unit 604), Alexander Livingston (Unit 604), and Acting Vice-President Pierre-Luc Dick were among the 80 Steelworkers in attendance.

"Among the topics discussed during the conference, one was particularly relevant to our industry: the digitization of the economy and its impact on our workplaces. Delegates from our Local had the opportunity to exchange and share their experiences in the telecommunications sector. Several other subjects were discussed, including the minimum wage, the CAQ government's Bill 21 and the long-awaited reform of the Occupational Health and Safety Act. In total, 95 resolutions were debated and voted on by delegates during these four days."

Members in the Lower Mainland are encouraged to support our talented Brother by attending this free event. Seating in the main auditorium is limited, so please arrive early.






