BARGAINING UPDATE: SHAW

ROUND OF BARGAINING **BEGINS FOR UNIT 60** SHAW ABBOTSFORD

The current Collective Agreement for Unit 60 Shaw Abbotsford members expires on March 31, 2020.

On November 27, 2019, members met to begin preparations for bargaining. They elected their bargaining committee which consists of James Large, Rob Wall, and Keller Reeves, who all have served on previous bargaining committees. The committee is supported by Local Union Representatives BC Steve McWhirter and Tamara Marshall, National Acting President Donna Hokiro, and USW Staff Representative Jayson Little.

The bargaining committee is scheduled to exchange opening proposals with the company and to begin the bargaining process later this year, when the situation allows it.

The terms of the existing agreement remain in effect for the duration of bargaining.

HEALTH AND SAFETY: CORONAVIRUS

Symptoms and effects on health

Those who are infected with COVID-19 may have little to no symptoms, and may not know they are carriers because symptoms are similar to a cold or flu.

Symptoms can take up to 14 days to appear, including fever, cough, difficulty breathing, and pneumonia. In severe cases, it can lead to death.

Right to refuse

Under the Occupational Health and Safety legislation, employees have a right to refuse work if they have reasonable grounds to believe it compromises their health or safety. Employees must report any dangerous situation to their supervisor.

The employer must then take remedial action by having the workplace health and safety committee and/or representative investigate. If the employer chooses to reassign work, the employee must receive the same wages and benefits they received under their previous assignment.

Employer's responsibilities

Employers are responsible for protecting the health and safety of employees at work and in the workplace. As it happens, if there is a risk of exposure to COVID-19 for employees while working, employers must assess the risk, and implement proper controls through their Hazard Prevention Program.

Employees must comply with the employer's procedures.

Discrimination

Discrimination on prohibited grounds is punishable under the Canadian law. This may apply to members who may be accused

of carrying the virus based on an identifier that is a prohibited ground of discrimination, such as ethnicity. If you think that you have been discriminated against, you may be able to file a complaint with the Canadian Human Rights Commission.

How you can help

Ask the government to take action and implement pharmacare and sick leaves for all. Get in touch with your provincial federations of labour and with the

Canadian Labour Congress, who never hesitate to put pressure on companies and those in power in order to improve workers' lives. And more than ever, now is the time to join the movement and add your voice for Pharmacare!

"This outbreak will prove that we must secure health care for all on a much larger scale. Pharmacare must be included in such a plan. It proves that WE the WORKERS are the economy. After this is all over, let's remember and reclaim our power and vow to never relinquish it again."

POLITICS MATTER. "I am extremely proud to have voted to call on Jason Kenney and his government to do the right thing," said Acting President Donna Hokiro. "The austerity of Kenney's government was off-base then and is completely dangerous, reckless and misguided now. He is putting you and yours at risk and is contributing to the rate of contagion as well as the number of those that will die. Protect, safeguard and be in service to the people of the province NOW, Jason Kenney!"

IBEW 213 members are still fighting for a fair contract with their employer Ledcor. They have been on a strike since September 30, 2019, but their fight for a collective agreement had started in August 2017 (to learn more about this, read our two articles about Ledcor scabs and inexperienced sub-contractors).

Beyond the strike and the fight for decent working conditions and wages, this is about changing the industry. "We were told before the drive: 'Good luck organizing Ledcor, it's not going to happen,'" said assistant IBEW business manager Robin Nedila.
