



DISTRICT 5 CONVENTION - MOBILIZATION IS PROGRESS



USW Quebec (D5) Director Dominic Lemieux opened the meeting by hammering home "Don't sleep on your solidarity," referring to the fact that one may be tempted to stop fighting after an agreement has been signed.



Bloc Québécois MP for Manicouagan Marilène Gill shared the victory of adopting the protection of pension plans law in case of bankruptcy, a project she strategically collaborated with the opposition parties.



A roundtable discussion occurred on workplace organizing, where we learned about the issues and stories of bringing new workplaces into the Union.



One of the most powerful moments of the Convention. Ocean Remorquage, on strike since June 20, faced the absence of a federal anti-scab legislation as their positions are currently occupied by sailors who are legally, but not ethically, hired. They needed people to join them on the picket line. Tons of members took the mic to offer their support.

Kalpona Akter, founder and director of the Solidarity Center for Bangladeshi Workers, gave a strong and moving testimony about the working conditions and severe punishments that workers can face if they rise against their boss in Bangladesh.

CUPE WINS AGAINST THE ONTARIO GOVERNMENT

On November 3, the Ontario government forced a collective agreement on education workers represented by the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE). That imposed Collective Agreement included a four-year contract that limits wage increases to 1.5% or 2.5%, and special legislation was passed preventing members from striking. Ontario Premier Doug Ford had also threatened a "notwithstanding" clause to block any legal challenge to this action.



In response to this unfair agreement and undemocratic restriction on Union activities, on November 4, 55,000 education workers started walking out, facing up to \$4,000 in daily fines to protest. The power of solidarity was their key weapon against injustice.

The walkout lasted four days. Faced with this strike, the Ford government finally agreed to withdraw its oppressive bill and return to the negotiation table.

Despite many late-hour attempts to achieve a freely negotiated settlement, the negotiations hit a wall again. So, on November 16, CUPE filed a five-day notice to go back on strike.

Finally, CUPE and the government agreed, including a raise in salaries of 3.59%, and on December 5, members voted to ratify the contract. Seventy-three percent (73) were in favour.



The story of CUPE versus the Ford Government should inspire each of us in Local 1944 to realize how much can be accomplished by workers who unite, support each other, refuse to be intimidated, and have "right" on their side. This is the unbeatable combination that defines the word

"SOLIDARITY."
