



TELUS MAKES PROGRESS; WHY DOESN'T YOUR COLLECTIVE AGREEMENT?

Telus makes progress on plans to grab market share ahead of Rogers/Shaw merger

In the media, Telus proudly boasts of having billions in capital expenditures ready for big projects, but the company sings a much different tune at the bargaining table by presenting and holding fast to concessions.

Earlier this month, Cartt.ca published an <u>article</u> featuring, Executive VP & COO, Tony Geheran discussing Telus' aggressive effort to grab market share. The article highlights Telus' announcement in May of last year that it would "invest an additional \$1.5 billion in capital expenditures over 18 months" and is even bumping up "investments that we would've otherwise made in 2023 and 2024".

But while the company focusses on rapid expansion, why does it rebuff strengthening its core foundation by reinvesting in its highly skilled and experienced workforce? You, the members.

Strange that a company with billions to expand, comes to the bargaining table with little else than a list of concessions. But, maybe it's a savvy business model? After all, "Telus has been able to build its fibre network at a low cost of capital", as the article highlights. But is that low cost human capital?

How Telus is currently bargaining would lead you to believe they view their workers as low cost human capital. After a global pandemic, you'd figure the company would recognize the tremendous efforts of you, the members, but instead they choose to nickel and dime. And why? According to the article, Telus fared well during the pandemic, despite the strain placed on the network due to surging bandwidth demand. But Geheran credits the network itself, saying "while the pandemic certainly registered a spike for us our network and the capacity within it was able to absorb it seamlessly."

That seamless resiliency of the network wasn't the technology alone, it was the collective efforts of you our members - braving the front lines and putting in the hours under incredible pressure to ensure the network held strong and the calls were answered. And now at bargaining time, all they are bringing are concessions.

"You don't just plug in a network and presto, everything runs smoothly," says Donna Hokiro, President of USW Local 1944. "Telus doesn't seem to get that it's their unionized employees, our members, who have worked tirelessly to make Telus great. It's our members that have lined the pockets of those at the top. They play lip service, but that's all it is, oh and disrespect. There's that."


