Last August 31, the workers of Bell Technical Solutions gathered in Montreal to send a message to the employer as the two parties participated in the conciliation process. The main demands of the bargaining unit's members include higher wages and more stable work schedules. The members and allies were also protesting the hiring of about 150 subcontractors to offset a labour shortage, although the parties were in bargaining.
